> Tiger Cubs Big Idea #17 Cub Scouting Here We Come CRAFTS Cub Scout Promise Plaque North Florida Council

Using craft sticks, tongue depressors, have the boys write the Cub Scout Promise. Allow 10 - 15 sticks per boy as their writing will be large at this stage and may only be able to get on word on each stick. Using a nail or a drill, make small holes through the end of the sticks and connect them in the appropriate order with yarn or twine.

Den Flag North Florida Council

The boys may want to create a new den flag for their new start in Cubs. They can also make a neckerchief slide for the wolf neckerchief they will need. For the den flag slide, use a small piece of wood, or construction paper. A craft stick can be used as a flagpole. The boys can decorate it with their den number. The slide can be made by a pipe cleaner, tightly looped to the back of the flag.

Cub Scout Neckerchief Slide North Florida Council

The head is made from a small Styrofoam ball or wood bead. Paint a face on it. A hat can be painted on or made out of construction paper. Insert a pipe cleaner in the head to form the neck. Twist another pipe cleaner around it for arms. The uniform shirt can be made from blue felt. The neckerchief is yellow pipe cleaner or yarn twisted around the neck. Use another pipe cleaner looped tightly for the slide part. This is glued to the head.

Equipment: Electric campfire with dimmer switch that can be operated unseen by adults. Start the ceremony off with the "Fire" dim.

1t. salt	

Mix eggs & sugar well. Add oil and mix well. Stir in zucchini & vanilla. Put in dry ingredients (already mixed together) and beat well. Pour into two greased and floured loaf pans. Bake at 325 degrees for one hour (check at 50 minutes).

Barbequed Spareribs 3-4 lbs. Spareribs 1 C. catusp 1/3 C worcestershire sauce 1t. chili powder 1 t. salt 1 1/2 C water Salt ribe lightly. Place in s

Salt ribs lightly. Place in shallow roasting pan, meaty side up. Roast in very hot oven (450 degrees) for 30 minutes. Meanwhile, combine next six ingredients for the sauce. Bring to a boil and simmer. Pour over ribs and lower oven temp. to 350 degrees. Bake for two hours or til done. Baste ribs with sauce every 15 minutes. If sauce gets too thick, add a little water.


Turn a pair of jeans into a backpack for a day hike with your den.



Wolf Head Neckerchief Slide Sam Houston Area Council

This neckerchief slide requires a section of turkey neck bone. A turkey's neck has 6 - 8 sections that looks remarkably like a wolf's head. Boil the neck and remove the meat and cartilage. Let dry for a day or two in a warm place. When dry, paint black. Cut ears from black felt, tongue from red felt. Eyes are small beads threaded onto a wire, which also forms the loop in the back for boy's neckerchief.

In addition to the awards, for each Bobcat recipient an inexpensive toy boat; for each Wolf recipient a small inexpensive airplane, one they assemble and fly; for each Bear recipient a train item such as a picture, track piece, or something like that; and for each Webelos recipient a piece of rope.

Cubmaster: This month our Cub Scouts traveled around in a variety of vehicles. (Sound ships horn and put on Captain's hat.) The Bobcats took a boat trip to a far away place. While on the boat they worked on the 7 steps to complete this rank. (Call Bobcats and parents forward. Present the badge to the parents and the boat to the Cub.)

(Throw the airplane. Put on pilot's gear and weird glasses. The Wolf Cub Scouts piloted a plane to an exotic place where they completed the requirements to earn the Wolf Badge. (Call Scouts and parents forward and present badge as before. Give the Scouts an airplane.)

(Make some sort of a train noise and put on conductor's hat.) The following Cub Scouts took a ride on a train to some unexplored areas. Will (names) and their parents come forward? These Scouts completed 12 achievements that demanded more time and effort. These Scouts have

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completed the third rank in Cub Scouting, the Bear badge. (Present badge to parents. Give Scouts train item.)

Sound ship's horn, toss airplane. Make train noise while exchanging hats.) The Webelos Scouts took a boat to the airport and then took the train to a destination unknown. They completed the activity requirements to earn the Webelos Badge and will now start working on the Arrow of Light. The following Scouts are preparing themselves for the wonderful world of Boy Scouting. (Call Scouts and parents forward. Present badges to parents.)

(Present Webelos Scouts with a piece of rope and tell them that they are on the final stage of Cub Scouting and to continue working to attain the highest honor a Cub Scout can earn - the Arrow of Light.

> Magic Neckerchief Graduation Graduation/Crossover Heart of America Council

In order for this to be effective, practice this ceremony several times. Some Cubs might treasure their neckerchiefs so as it suggest in this ceremony, use a master neckerchief--Baloo

Personnel: Cubmaster (CM), assistant, one person for lights

Equipment: Candle, holder, (or advancement log) matches, 2 coat hangers with safety pins secured to one end of each hanger, a large mouth peanut butter jar with exactly 40% acetone and 60% water, a fire extinguished/baking soda for safety. (To save time have a set of wire hangers and safety pin or use one master

neckerchief.) **Setting:** Dim the lights while calling the graduating Cub and their parents to the front. Leave only the lights in front on while telling the story.

CM: Tonight our ____Cub Scouts are graduating to ____ Will these boys and their parents come forward. These young men have reached the _____grade and have completed the requirements for ____. There remains one test before they become _____Scouts. A test to find out if they have done "their best". This ceremony begins with a story passed on to me from other Scouts leaders. And I share it with you tonight.

Deep in the heart of the mountains and deserts of New Mexico, there is an Indian village beside a small stream. The village and the area around it are very green and lush. This is very unusual for the village is in the middle of very harsh desert land. While hiking in the area, I came across this village and stopped by a nearby stream for a rest. My **BOY**, you have felt the uplift; you have seen the glory of the **MOUNTAIN**.

Oh, ye Scouters, keep this in mind, then; the badges we offer for attainment are not prizes. Prizes are things of value taken from another. Scout badges, though are merely tokens of what you have done, or where you have been.. There are mere twigs from the trail to show how far you have gotten in climbing the **MOUNTAIN**.

GAMES

Air Routes

Heart of America Council Players are seated in a circle. Each one is given the name of some city or airport. One player has no chair. He stands inside the circle and calls "All aboard for the plane from Kansas City to Boston". The two players representing these cities must change seats. The caller tries to get a seat during the scramble. The player left without a seat becomes the caller.

Compass Points

From "Scouting Games", Sir Robert Baden-Powell Simon Kenton Council

With a piece of chalk, draw eight lines, intersecting in "star" fashion, all radiating from the center, to indicate the points of the compass. One line should point due north. One Scout now takes up his position at the outer end of each line and represents one of the eight principal points of the compass. The leader now calls out any two points, such as SE and N. and the two Scouts at those points must immediately change places. Anyone moving out of place without his point being named, or moving to a wrong place, should lose a point. When changing places, Scouts must not cross the lines, but must go outside the circle of players. When a Scout loses three points, he is out of the game.

Stay At The Head Of The Line Simon Kenton Council

This is a good hiking game. The first person in line asks the next person to identify the object at which he is pointing. If he answers correctly, he goes to the head of the line. If he misses, he goes to the end. This continues until all boys have had a turn.

FUN FOOD

Trail Foods Simon Kenton Council

Trail foods are simple to make and carry, do not spoil easily, and provide energy without a lot of empty calories. **Apple Sandwiches-** Slices of apples with slices of cheese between them. Dip the apple slices in lemon juice to keep them fresh looking.

GORP "Good Old Raisins and Peanuts" Mix - Equal handfuls of raisins, nuts, and other bite -sized ingredients - small crackers, non-sugary cereal, other dried fruits, coconut chunks, etc. Avoid chocolate, sugars, and excess salt.

Hikers Nosebag - Sort of a sack lunch for the trail. In a plastic bag put an apple, 1/2-cup raisins, and 1/4lb. chunk of cheese, 1/2 cup of M&M's or other chocolate. Nibble as you go. Use dried apples for more portability.

Honey Bars - Made ahead of the hike and worth every second of it! Try this as a den activity: combine 1/2 cup each or raisins, figs, dried apricots, and peanuts or almonds. Grind/chop/blend them together. Add 1/2-teaspoon lemon juice and just enough honey to bind it all together. Form into bars and wrap in aluminum foil. Carry in plastic bags (these are quite sticky if they leak, so double wrap them!) Substitute ingredients at will.

Birdseed (Sweet version of GORP). Mix equal amounts of sugary cereal, chocolate candies (M&M's do not easily melt on a hike!), and roasted or honey-roasted nuts. Add graham cracker bits for more crunchiness.

Healthy Snacks - Look in your grocery or health food store for dried fruits (banana chips, papayas, etc.), yogurt-covered nuts or fruit, and other treats. Some carry bags of mixed treats perfect for trails.

Trail Lunches - Not as cheap as other options, but a fun meal. Combine at least one thing from several categories: Meat/cheese - meat jerky, hard sausages, pepperoni, hard cheese, protein bars (health food stores); Breads - Melba toast, pilot biscuits, granola bars with lots of grains, hardtack, other hard/dried breads (not the ones that would mold or go stale); Fruit candy, fruit leather or snacks

(make sure they have lots of real fruit in them); Dairy yogurt - coated nuts or fruit, hard cheese; Sweets - M&M's or tropical chocolate, hard candy, most granola or fruit snacks, etc.



> How Old Is That Tree? Sam Houston Area Council

The only way to tell the age of a tree exactly is to cut it down and count its annual rings of growth. However, we can estimate the age of a standing tree using this method?

- Solution Series Weaking Series (distance around) about 4 1/2 feet above the ground.
- © Divide the circumference by 3 to find the diameter
- To find the tree's age, multiply the diameter (in inches) by the correct factor listed in the table below

These factors vary because of the differences in the growth rate of trees. (Note: If the tree gets more water and nutrients than average, it will be younger than it looks. If it lives in stressful conditions -- poor soil, less than average water, drainage, or disease -- it will be older than it looks.

Forester Neckerchief Sam Houston Area Council

Make a neckerchief for each boy out of inexpensive cotton fabric. When a boy can identify a particular forest tree leaf, print the leaf on his neckerchief. Eventually each boy will have a permanent record of the six forest trees he has identified.

Leaf Prints -- Spread neckerchief fabric on a sheet of newspaper. Place a leaf, vein side up, on another sheet of newspaper and paint the leaf with fabric paint. Be sure to cover the entire leaf, but try not to put paint on too thick or your finished product may look smudgy. When the leaf is covered, turn it paint side down onto the neckerchief. Cover the leaf with a single piece of clean newspaper and gently move a roller back and forth over the leaf two or three times. Pick up the newspaper and discard it, then gently remove the leaf. Green leaves work just as well as dried ones and often can be used for repeat images. To make the image permanent, press the neckerchief with a warm iron after the paint has dried.

Webelos Ceremony

At USSSP we had a question about the Arrow of Light ceremony and when is the best time to do an AOL ceremony. Mike Bowman at USSSP suggested the following.

In general I highly recommend two separate ceremonies for the Arrow of Light presentation and crossing-over from Webelos to Boy Scouts. This is not hard to do and something that has worked well for me in similar situations. What I would do runs like this: Conduct your advancement ceremony near the middle of the Pack Meeting and top it off with a very special Arrow of Light Ceremony. When you are done

close the advancement ceremony. At this point break the action with a few items to finish your Pack Meeting. By now you should be nearing the end of the meeting. At this point you might announce that the Pack's business for the night is nearly closed except for a very special event that commemorates x number of Webelos Scouts that are this night graduating from the Cub Scouting program and

becoming Boy Scouts at Troop(s) xxx and yyy. Introduce the Scout leaders (adult and youth) from the Troop. Call the graduating Webelos forward as a group to stand on one side of the front of the room.

Have the Scout leaders on the other side. Call out each name. As the boy crosses to the other side he is welcomed by a Boy Scout leader and perhaps presented with a Troop Neckerchief and red tabs for his shirt or a Boy Scout handbook. If you have time, you could rig up a bridge for the boys to walk across to signify bridging over to Webelos.

A popular ceremony using a very simple bridge follows: Try this simple cross-over idea with some great symbology. Needed: four 4"x4"x5' posts and five 12"x2"x5' planks. Paint one plank blue, one gold, one red, and one BSA green. Leave one unpainted. Paint the posts brown. Ask the Webelos Den Leaders to place one of the posts on the ground in a N-S direction. Then ask the Scoutmaster to place a second post on the ground about four feet away and parallel in a N-S direction. Announce that this is symbolic of the foundations of Scouting that these leaders have laid through outings represented by the natural brown color. Then ask each set of leaders to place an E-W post over the N-S posts about three to four feet apart, pointing out that by building on Scouting's foundations these leaders have set the stage for bridging the boys from Cub Scouting to Boy Scouting. Have Webelos #1 and his parents bring the unpainted plank forward and place it across the E-W posts. State that this represents the boys as the arrived in Cub Scouting full of potential but unfinished. (If they were in Tigers use a plank painted orange and make a statement about how they were on fire to learn about Scouting). Ask Webelos #2 and parents to bring the blue plank forward and place it snuggly against the unfinished plank. State that this represents the Wolf and Bear years where with the help of their parents the Scouts became true blue and loyal friends. Next Webelos #3 comes forward with his parents and places the gold plank next to the blue to represent their golden years in Cubbing as Webelos learning important skills through activity badges culminating in the Arrow of Light. Webelos #4 comes forward with his parents and the green plank. Announce that this represents their new beginning as Boy Scouts who will soon be green Tenderfoot Scouts, anxious to begin the Boy Scout trail to Eagle. Finally, Webelos #5 and parents put down the red plank. Comment that this plank is red like the predominant color in the Eagle badge and represents the beginning of their journey to become Eagles. Webelos are assembled at the unfinished board side of the now completed bridge and presented graduation certificates and a patch board of their Cub Scout badges and awards (many use a large piece of plywood cut in the shape of a Scout emblem and covered

with blue felt on which are mounted the badges earned by the Scout).

When these presentations are over, the Scoutmaster invites each boy in turn to cross the bridge. Once over, he is welcomed into the Troop. His Webelos neckerchief is replaced by the Troop neckerchief in a presentation. Same thing for each boy. Say some personal words about how proud you are of their accomplishments and how you know they will work hard and succeed in whatever they try in Boy Scouting (Positive expectations = positive results). End of ceremony. Go home and cry tears of pride and joy at seeing them grow up so fast and well.
